What a wonderful time it is for Govan High!

Our stated objective as a school is to get each of our pupils into a positive destination when they leave us.

Our dream is that nobody who is available for work fails to find it and we are getting ever closer to seeing that dream come true.

This year, our positive destinations figures are 12 per cent better than our previous best, which was last year.

Our first-year pupils are settling in very well and there are so many positive things happening in the school.

When we checked some statistics, we found that compared to last session (for August till the end of November) attendance is up



1.8 per cent, exclusion incidents are down by 65 per cent and openings lost because of exclusions are down by 76 per cent.

Recently, I was at the Glasgow Royal Concert Hall watching our dancers participate in the dance festival and competition run through the Celtic and Rangers education partnership. All the schools' team members had been trained by choreographers supplied through the football clubs.

We were all very proud when the Govan High team won the top prize, bringing a trophy back to the school. This is further evidence of the value of the work done by our dancer in residence Gavin Dorrian in our Dance Studio.

I am delighted to be able to highlight this good news and the other great achievements that you will be able to read about in this newsletter.

She follows in the footsteps of her late grandfather Johnny Neill, who was also a fabricator in the Govan yard.

Stephanie (pictured above) said: "Grandad would talk about life in the yard to my gran and she's spoken to me about it too. I'd like

to think he'd be proud of me."

The former Govan High girl is one of five girls to be taken on as apprentices by yard bosses at BVT Surface Fleet Solutions – the new name for BAE Systems.

Stephanie will join 600 male fabricators at the Govan and Scotstoun yards, piecing together the masses of steel that make up ships.

Training officer John Burnett said: "We're delighted that

"The tradition is not as strong today but, where possible, we are more than happy to encourage it."

The Clyde is building six Type 45 Destroyers. Three are finished, while another is due to be launched in November.









Football visit scores in Africa



RANGERS' captain Barry Ferguson, and the Ibrox club's youth team, presented Ian Davidson MP with a selection of gifts for footballcrazy schoolchildren in Malawi recently.

Ian was then part of a Commonwealth Parliamentary Association delegation that visited the African state in August.

He said: "During the trip I visited the Milonde Community Day Secondary School which is twinned with Govan High.

Rangers, through the club's Charity Foundation, have donated strips, tracksuits, drinks bottles, and boot bags for the Milonde pupils. The children there love their football and were delighted with these gifts from Rangers.

The pupils at Govan High have formed a very close bond with the school, and there is also a growing link between Hills Trust Primary and the local primary in Milonde.

Barry Ferguson said: "The Charity Foundation has done a tremendous amount of work in giving kit to children in countries around the world, and as a club we are delighted to be sending this kit to a school which has got such close links to our local community here."

Connal Cochrane, Rangers Charity Foundation Manager, added: "We are delighted to supply children in Africa with some Rangers kit and hope this further helps the good relationship the Milonde School has with Glasgow."

School chosen to launch report

THE pupils and staff at Govan High were delighted to host a high profile Westminster delegation during the final week of last term.

The Scottish Affairs Committee launched its Employment and Skills for the Defence Industry in Scotland Report at the school in June.

The Committee's Chairman, Glasgow Central MP Mohammed Sarwar MP, gave an overview of the inquiry and other committee members – Ian Davidson MP, Jim Devine MP and Angus MacNeill MP – were also present to give their views on issues raised in the report.

Govan High itself gave evidence to the Committee on the training it provides to prepare its pupils for a career in the defence industry.

Depute Head Teacher Kevin Sweeney said: "We're obviously delighted that this major report is being launched in our school, and we're very happy that we were given a chance to contribute to it.

"This report explores key areas of employment which we hope will bring future benefits to a significant number of our pupils.

"It's an honour to welcome such a high profile delegation, and to show them what's on offer here at Govan High."

Areas explored by the inquiry include the Future Carrier programme, the sustainability of the defence industry, and the challenges it faces.

The report launch was featured on the STV news programme Scotland Today.

THE Technical Department pulled out all the stops to build NHS Greater Glasgow and Clyde's float for this year's Govan Fair.

As in previous years, the Govan Fair raises funds for the Southern General Patients' Welfare. The people of Govan have always been generous in supporting the hospital and this year was no exception.

Bryan Bannerman, Voluntary Services' manager for the Southern General Hospital has

been organising the Southern General's float for the past eight years.

He said: "Staff and pupils put a lot of hard work and effort into building and organising the float, but the evening itself is worth it, it's a great night and a good atmosphere.

The Positive Destinations programme

SINCE returning to school in August, the Positive Destinations team have been busy checking which pupils have also returned and those who have moved on to employment, further or higher education.

It's is a big priority at Govan High that everyone who moves does so to a positive destination and we are working hard to ensure this happens.

At the end of September, the Government receives information from



Careers Scotland about the number of pupils who have not yet managed to get a job or a place in college or university

The figures are not finalised, but it looks likely that the number of pupils from Govan High who will be classed "unemployed" will be a lot lower than last year

This is largely due to a lot of work and support from a number of staff in the school. Work has also started with those pupils who could potentially leave school in December this year. We have held meetings with Paul Burns of Con Sol Services Ltd. to discuss a programme to train some of our young people. They will get basic qualifications or certificates in construction and hospitality, guaranteeing six months work from January and preparing them for apprenticeship applications in the summer.

We also organised a second breakfast meeting with local employers, to discuss with them how the school and employers can work with youngsters to prepare them for the world of work.

Meanwhile, funds allocated to the Positive Destinations programme are supporting a wide range of vocational courses. Already we have bought welding screens for the metalwork class, practise heads and smocks for hairdressing, microphones for music and dance and more.

Finally, Positive
Destinations supported the superb summer show,
Midsummer Madness,
performed by our dance group and supported by a number of other pupils in backstage and front of house duties. The showcase was a resounding success over two nights in June and was enjoyed by parents and quests of the school.

Melbourne also made Australian-themed bookmarks.


The finished bookmarks were then swapped by post and every pupil involved got a bookmark from the other country.

■ AU leavers - Another year of 100% Positive Destinations

This year was another success in terms of Positive Destinations for the pupils who left the Autism Unit (AU) this summer.

All six have moved on to college courses. We wish Andros Withers, Zeeshaan Tayab, Ian Kernohan, Sean Dillon, Lloyd McKay and Darren McKay all the best for the future.

■ Work experience

Our work experience programme is under way, with three pupils – Gary Adams, Ryan Kelly and Denise Boyle – already on placements.

Denise, who loves animals, has a placement at the Reptile House in Queen's Park which she really enjoys.

The pupils are supported on their placements by mental health charity, ENABLE.

■ Pre-vocational courses and college – school Link Courses

Once again our pupils are involved in courses outwith the AU which help to prepare them for their future and get them used to different settings and meeting new people.

This year, 14 pupils are involved in the courses which include construction, furniture assembly, cake decorating and sport and fitness.

■ Visit by Normandy veterans of the Second World War

Veterans visited the AU to talk to the pupils about their experiences. The pupils were really interested to hear first hand their experiences of the D-Day landings.

The veterans brought their collection of medals and also presented a commemorative plaque to the AU.



FIFTEEN pupils from the Autism Unit spent two nights staying at Loch Lomond Youth Hostel and two days of activities with Can You Experience, a company that provides canoeing, team building and bushcraft training.

The Scottish Youth Hostels Association have joined with Provident to provide 'Give us a Break' funding for groups in danger of social exclusion.

This was a wonderful opportunity for the pupils to build relationships with peers and staff, to share an experience and to encourage independence.

And did it succeed in these aims? "Yes" was the resounding reply from all!



Bank on the future pupils learn finance facts

PUPILS from the Autism Unit have launched a new school bank in partnership with The Royal Bank of Scotland (RBS).

Financial education experts from the RBS worked closely with teachers and pupils from the school to launch the bank.

The new bank is part of a programme developed by RBS called: "School Money – the school bank from RBS" which helps teachers and pupils set up a school bank in primary and secondary schools.

The school bank is one element of Moneysense for

Schools, formerly known as Face 2 Face With Finance, the financial education programme developed by RBS for schools.

Students who are working in the school bank have received training in reading financial documents, listening to instructions, completing pay-in slips and keeping accurate financial records.

Students are encouraged to plan ahead and save through their account.
