Positive Destinations – our new Employment & Skills Coach

I'm Kirsteen Dunn and I'm the Employment & Skills Coach for Govan High based in the Pastoral Care office on a Thursday and Friday each week. I work for the Employment & Skills Partnership Team within Glasgow City Council's Education Services. I have worked within Glasgow City Council for 10 years, firstly delivering SVQ qualifications in Administration and Customer and Financial Services to S3 & S4 pupils. I was then involved in helping to manage the college courses that many of you have the opportunity



to attend. Throughout this time I have also been involved in the recruitment and selection of young people interested in the Commonwealth Apprenticeship Initiative.

My role within the school is to help pupils develop their Employability Skills, which may involve me delivering relevant qualifications to groups or working one to one to help with job applications, CV's and preparing for interviews. I am currently co-ordinating the completion of the Skills and Aspirations Audit by all S3, S4, S5 & S6 pupils. The aim of this audit is to find out when young people are planning on leaving school and what line of work, training or further education they want to pursue. The results will allow Glasgow City Council and its partners to ensure that the Scottish Government's policy of Opportunities for All is met, whereby every 16-19 year old will have access to a place in Education, Employment or Training upon leaving school.

The Commonwealth Apprenticeship Initiative (CAI) is beginning to release this year's Modern Apprenticeship opportunities, therefore if anyone is interested in applying for one, please come and speak to me. I can help you to register with the CAI database, if you have not already done so, or help you to apply.

I look forward to helping you to move along your chosen career path.

Mark Cameron – our Modern Apprentice

My name is Mark Cameron, 18 years old and I am a Modern Apprentice working in Govan High. I have been working in Govan High for just over a year now and I have another year to go in my Apprenticeship. Within the school I am based in the Pastoral Care office and my main roles are office tasks. The office tasks that I will be doing will include producing documents, photocopying for teachers, taking minutes of meetings and updating and editing documents. I was based in the school 4 days a week for most of last year however this has now changed and I am only in the school on a Monday and Wednesday now. As well as the tasks I carry out for the school, I also need to do a VQ as part as my Apprenticeship.

A VQ is a recognised qualification which is very good to have on your

CV. Last year I worked through and completed my Advice & Guidance qualification whilst working in the school, to help complete my Advice and Guidance qualification last year I took advisor classes of my own. I got every pupil in the school registered onto the My World of Work website, and gave them a tour of the site to show them how it works. I also worked with Mr Sweeney as part of the Positive Destinations team and attended the Positive Destinations meetings in which I took the minutes and distributed them out to the correct staff.

This year I will be completing my Business and Administration Level 3 qualification. A VQ requires a lot of hard work and it takes a lot of time to complete so I need to stay focussed to get it completed as well as doing my day-to-day roles in the school.



Switzerland CERN September – experience of a lifetime.

After meeting the nine other Glasgow school students at a particle physics lecture at Glasgow University, I wasn't worried at all about going. The other recipients of the CERN trip competition were intelligent, likeminded and lovable. We spent 3 nights at CERN, staying in a hotel within the CERN area. During our stay, we visited the ATLAS, CMS and LHCb experiments – all doing different research in the field of particle physics. The most interesting was the LHCb's research into the existence of antimatter and processes that violate symmetry in the universe. But, we learned about the components and the workings of all three and they were all so interesting. What astounded me most was the immense scale and beautiful intricacy of each experiment.

We also got the chance to eat dinner and chat with PH.d. students, completing their doctorate at CERN. It was insightful and, most importantly, reassuring. They mentioned the travel opportunities they had had and the idea of studying physics became instantly appealing. I love physics even more now because being at CERN made me feel like I was let into a secret club, a club whereby only the members are aware of the universe for it really is, everything from the nucleus to the cosmos.

While in Geneva, we got a break from physics and took part in a treasure hunt around the city. We were able to see a lot of the sights and indulge in a fondue feast in a quaint little restaurant near the city centre. For thirteen of us to eat it cost 500 francs. A bit steep for a bit of bread and cheese!!

I am so grateful I got given the opportunity to go to CERN. I was able to reassure myself I am choosing the right subject to study and also meet friends for life. And admittedly, eating lunch in the same cafeteria at the same time as Nobel Prize winners was magnificent. Il never forget my CERN experience, it was truly one of best trips of my life.

FROM THE HEAD TEACHER'S OFFICE

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The Town House Collection Apprenticeship

This year a group of Scotland's Hotels have come together to create a three year apprenticeship, giving people of all ages the chance to work in the hospitality industry.

Two of our former pupils, Jamie Lee McKenzie and Courtney Early, were invited to an interview at the Blythswood hotel in July. Willie Jones, Food and Beverages Manager of Gleneagles Hotel, suggested the girls for this great opportunity. Jamie Lee and Courtney passed the interview and got the apprenticeship along with 8 other apprentices.

Willie Jones said, "the idea for the apprenticeship programme came after seeing the superb results we have seen working with the pupils of Govan High school along with the Govan Weavers Society on the numerous dinners we have delivered at the Pearce Institute - all of which have been an incredible success and more importantly the young people have gained invaluable experiences from it.

We got to the stage at the school were a number of pupils were asking me how they can come and work in a hotel or restaurant as a chef or as a waiter and to be honest at the time I struggled to offer the best advice as I knew we as industry didn't have the right training structure/approach for young people leaving High school as other industries do for example in engineering or construction."

The programme will last for three years, the first two years working in all the hospitality departments for six months at a time, for example Housekeeping, F&B Service, Kitchen, Front Office and finally a work placement in another hotel.

On the 12th of September Jamie Lee and Courtney will go into their third year and they will get to choose which department they want to work in for that final year. Not only do they get a chance to work in the best hotels and get



this great opportunity for a life long career, they also get to go to Italy at the end of the two years and to Disneyland for a scholarship at the end of three years. This is a chance of a lifetime for Jamie Lee and Courtney to start their career in the hospitality industry – and it all began in Govan High School's Hospitality course with Ms Baxter! What a fantastic example of logical progression from the school's Future Skills Curriculum to the world of work.









AUSTRALIA EXCHANGE

A group of 15 pupils and 2 members of staff from Mount Gambier High School in South Australia visited Govan High School from Sept 30th – Oct 7th. There is a long standing link between the two schools and this was the 6th time MGHS has visited Govan. All the Australian pupils were hosted by Govan pupils who worked exceedingly hard to make the visitors feel welcome. They attended classes with their hosts and learned some Scottish Country Dancing. They also got to taste haggis, neeps and tatties when Ms Baxter and the senior hospitality class prepared some traditional Scottish food. On Sunday pupils from Govan High School accompanied the Mount Gambier students as they travelled around the highlands, stopping at Luss, Tyndrum, Kilmahog and Callander. 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School of Football trip to Valencia

On the 16th of May 2014 three members of staff and thirty School of Football (SoF) pupils travelled to Valencia for a development tour. Various external agencies provided funding support to make the cost of the tour more reasonable and the pupils fundraised throughout the year by taking part in bag packs in our local community. As a local partner Brookfield Multiplex provided funding for SoF tracksuits so that our pupils all dressed the same and looked great.

The experience started with pupils travelling to Spain by aeroplane, which was a first for many of our pupils. As you can imagine all the pupils were excited and were looking forward to what was to come. When we arrived in Spain we were met by our inspiring sport rep Ram, who welcomed us to Valencia and took us to the hotel. The hotel was located a stone's throw away from the Valencia first team training complex and as we arrived pupils were excited to get started. The group got checked in and pupils were shown to their rooms and needed to get ready for their first training session of the tour underneath the floodlights. Pupils were coached by Valencia coaches with the focus on skill development and team play. The SoF pupils trained twice a day with one morning session and one afternoon session and were challenged both as an individual and as a team player.

As part of the programme the group visited Iale La Eliana School in Valencia. The visit was included in the programme for our pupils to see and experience school life in a different country. The pupils were given a tour of the school, attended some classes and spoke with students and teachers to share experiences. There were many differences that our pupils highlighted, however the main difference that was noticed was that all students had an I pad and there were no text books in the school. At the end of our visit to the school the Headteacher spoke with our students about the importance of education and working towards qualifications.

The feedback from the pupils was that the best part of the tour was playing Spanish opposition; we split the pupils into two teams, a S1/2 team and a S2/3 team. Both teams competed against Valencia youth teams and performed really well in the heat. The Valencia teams played the "typical" Spanish way demonstrating the "Tiki-taka" style that they are famous for. However at Govan High School we have many talented players and the S2/3 team performed heroically and were leading 1-0 until the last ten minutes when Valencia scored a late equaliser. The performance was summed up when Lee Spence of S3 ran the length of the pitch to block a cross from a Valencia player to stop an attack, which was no easy task considering the conditions were so hot. The S1/2 team were similar in their efforts and although they lost the game they demonstrated fantastic team work and there were great individual performances. The SoF pupils enjoyed the experience of playing Spanish opposition and had to adapt their communication skills before, during and after the game when interacting with the opposition players.

Overall the SoF pupils had a fantastic experience in Valencia and developed many skills that will help them in future years. We have created some videos of the tour, which I hope to upload soon.

This session there are two GHS classes attending courses in GTG: on Tuesday afternoons there is a class in City & Guilds Motor Vehicle Mechanics and on Thursday afternoons there is a class in Business Administration.

And, while attending the ceremony, Kevin and Sonja were pleased to see former pupil, Amanda Martin, walk across the stage to receive an award in SVQ Level 3 Customer Service.

Afterwards Amanda told us what she has been doing since leaving Govan High. "Since leaving school I have done loads. My trip with the army cadet force

Recently, I went to Fusilier House, the West Lowland Battalion's cadet training centre. This was part of a youth outreach project. The Govan High pupils who went on the trip were William Bowden, Mirren Johnston, Dylan Sanderson, Lee Airdrie, Keiran Gilogley, Lauren Costick and me. There were two other schools involved: Park School from Kilmarnock and Carrick academy from Ayr.

When we arrived I didn't know what to expect. We got split up into three different groups. I was in the Mounties with two other girls, six boys and two teachers, Mr Saleh and a teacher from Carrick Academy. They went over safety issues and rules.

The next day we did archery, biking, field craft and tug of war. I didn't like that day because when we were going down a steep hill I didn't use my brakes and I went crashing into one of the girls in front of me. The wheels got stuck into my leg and I sat down in tears. A cadet medic checked my leg and a few minutes later minutes I was able to get back onto the bike. I did well after that because that taught me a lesson :to use my brakes going down a hill!

We had to get up every morning at 6:30 am and lights out was at 11pm. Every day was the same: rules and routine. The rules were no male goes into the female accommodation and the females don't go into the male accommodation. We had to drink plenty of water. Sergeant Campbell said we had to drink one whole bottle every hour.

The activities we did were archery, biking, first aid, tug of war, bowling, swimming, field craft, command tasks, teamwork, climbing walls, drill and map and compass. we also learned the telephony alphabet.

Friday was competition and presentation day. We marched into the hall where all the families were. In syndicate the Mounties came third. Then it was the best and most improved student out of each syndicate. Then it was the best student overall. When Mr Grady said my name I was speechless, over the moon proud! It was most of all unexpected. My mum came and picked me up from the school. When I told her she was proud as well.

This year I am part of the Govan High School Cadet detachment. We have been doing the Westminster curriculum, learning about the history of the cadets and about rank. We have also been doing lots of drill. In the cadets I am learning a whole lot of skills that you can't really get in ordinary school lessons. I really enjoy being in the cadets.

Govan High School at Glasgow University Service of Remembrance

Acting Headteacher Andy Masterson, Pupil Support Assistant Eddie Grady, Senior Pupil Kristofer Shaw and Voluntary Archivist Ian McCracken recently attended a World War One Centenary Service in the University's Memorial Chapel. Govan High was the only Glasgow school to be represented at this first event in the University's series of commemorations.

The Govan High representatives were in attendance because the names of two members of the Govan High "family" are inscribed on the wall of the Chapel on the Roll of Honour. They were John Kennedy, who was a graduate of the University and George B Smith, who worked in the University Library. John was killed in April 1917 and George in October 1918-tragically only a few weeks before the Armistice.

After being welcomed by University Chaplain Stuart MacQuarrie, we took our seats for the Service. This included the hymns "I to the hills will lift mine eyes" and "O God of Bethel". The Last Post was sounded by a member of the University's Officer Training Corps", and after a two minute silence, everyone then followed the Chancellor and academic staff outside, where a cross was laid in a new Commemorative Garden. Over the next four years, it is intended to place a cross for each of the 761 men and women from the University who lost their lives in the First World War.

Everyone then returned to the Chapel for the opening of a special exhibition on the University and the First World War. Well-known broadcaster and historian Dr Tony Pollard launched this. It was gratifying to hear Govan High mentioned in Tony's speech.

All four representatives from Govan High who had the privilege of attending this special Service will long treasure memories of it. **10**
