

Our new hospital

NHS Greater Glasgow and Clyde (NHSGGC) is working with families, children, young people and local communities, to build a new children's hospital in Govan – on the existing site of the Southern General Hospital.

The hospital will be developed alongside new adult and maternity facilities, providing the best possible care for babies, children, young people and adults. NHS Greater Glasgow and Clyde is planning to invest in excess of £550 million in delivering these modern hospitals that will provide a local, regional and national centre of excellence.

A youth panel has been established to make sure that the issues, needs and hopes of teenagers are included in the design of the new hospital and a family panel will provide guidance on how best to engage with families 'NHS GREATER GLASGOW AND CLYDE (NHSGGC) IS PLANNING TO INVEST IN EXCESS OF £550 MILLION'

and include their ideas in the planning and design process.

A reception was held recently at the Lighthouse in Glasgow to provide upto-date information on the progress of the planning for the new hospital.

exciting vocational and creative classes including hairdressing, dance and theatre arts, construction, motor vehicle mechanics and media studies
an ethos based on future skills with the aim of equipping students with the skills they require for life beyond school.

Already this year Govan High pupils have passed assessments that put them at the forefront of learners in Scotland.

The XL Group has devised, filmed and presented a DVD on life at the school with assistance from the BBC.

Plus, pupils hosted a Glasgow conference on poverty whose guests included Deputy First Minister Nicola Sturgeon.

Govan High pupils, parents and supporters have raised thousands of pounds to provide electricity for our partner school in Malawi. And, to crown it all off, at the end of the year the theatre arts students staged an outstanding production of "Cinderella" in front of a number of distinguished guests.

If you're looking for statistics from this session, Govan High School exclusions are down, attendance is up and our Positive Destination figures for leavers are the best ever.

Also, following the success of last year's work in Malawi, a second group of pupils will be visiting our partner school.

The media studies class have had a special study visit to Disneyland Paris and got the chance to actually see with their own eyes how the media world operates for real.

And finally, some pupils have visited Norway on a European Community programme.

As you can see, with so much going on it's easy to see why we think we're the best small school in Scotland!

Their study visit was to look at what the Australians are doing in vocational education and training (VET). As a result of this visit, several innovative vocational courses are now being offered at Govan High.

Pupils heading for the right destination in life

AS reported in our last newsletter the Positive Destinations programme has been set up to achieve the aim of making sure every pupil who leaves has a job, college or university place to go to. This is a major priority at Govan High!

During last session and over the next two sessions, the school has received additional funding for this from the Government, Glasgow City Council and the Hunter Foundation (funded by Scottish businessman and philanthropist Sir Tom Hunter).

The programme has been set up to support and develop various learning activities and experiences which will help pupils increase motivation and self-confidence, and to develop a wide range of employability skills, including teamwork, showing initiative, and rising to challenges.

Bullying on the net is not a game

Four of our S1 Pupils, Demi Carey, Kieran Young, Stephen Bradley and Shannon Murray, are set to become stars of the silver screen to hammer home an important message about stamping out cyber bullying.

The young stars took part in a hard-hitting drama about some of the more unexpected dangers of MSN messaging and social networking sites.

They performed this drama live to S1 pupils and were so good that Glasgow Support Services put it on to film.

The film will be used in Primary Schools across the city. It could be the start of a dazzling career for these four S1 stars! As previously reported, funding from the programme has been used to support our senior and junior dance groups.

The pupils followed up their outstanding showcase "Steps, Notes and Squeaks" in June, with a Christmas Pantomime performance of "Cinderella" in December, which was thoroughly enjoyed by a packed audience on each night.

Invited guests including Deputy First Minister Nicola Sturgeon, and executive director of Education and Social Work Services Margaret Doran, came along to watch a performance.

Both these important guests spoke highly of the levels of skill and confidence displayed by our pupils.

Mr Coates' Technical class (or Help us Get a job class – to give it its other name!) which concentrates on making things to order, and have met with Norie Mackie of the Pierce Institute, to discuss placing the table somewhere it will be useful.

Our new job-related courses such as hairdressing, motor mechanics and voice and data cabling are going well. Following on from third year a group of second-year pupils are now on a



five-day outward bound programme, enjoying such activities as kayaking, mountain biking, hill walking, gorge walking and raft building.

Skills such as planning, organisation, and working with others are being developed through these activities.

Just before the Christmas break, we employed a French-speaking football coach to come in once a week, to help to raise interest and levels of ability in French – through football.

This short programme was tremendously successful and enjoyed by the pupils.

We have also employed Jacqui Fitzpatrick, our youth support worker who is offering additional time with our second and third year pupils, particularly girls.

In addition to all of this, a number of our fourth and fifth year leavers are continuing to receive additional individual advice from Careers Scotland.

We are also setting up a mentor scheme for all fourth, fifth and sixth year leavers, where more than 20 members of staff have volunteered to meet regularly with pupils, in their own time, to talk to them about their



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plans for when they leave school.

The Positive Destinations programme is designed to encourage pupils to be more involved in their learning and to improve attendance, attitudes and skills development through taking part in active and creative learning experiences.

In this way pupils will not
